

British Airways flies from London to Boston (from £448; ba.com). For visa information, check with the US State Department (unitedstatesvisas.us).


### Getting around

# 9 STEPS ALONG A SPOOKY TOUR OF MASSACHUSETTS

The characterful and welcoming PAQUACHUCK

**INN** in Westport Point is a wonderful

way to ease yourself into a road trip around Massachusetts. Antiques and tales of the village's seafaring past abound (from £80, with shared bathroom; paquachuck.com). Feast on locally sourced oysters, clams, scallops and lobster nearby at THE BACK EDDY (mains from £12; thebackeddy.com).

2Learn of New England's maritime history and connections to far-off lands at the New Bedford Whaling National Historical Park. Highlights are

SEAMEN'S BETHEL

(pictured right; donations; portsociety. org) and the grand NEW BEDFORD WHALING MUSEUM (adults £6: whalingmuseum.org).

LONGFELLOW'S WAYSIDE INN in Sudbury lays claim to being the oldest inn still operating in the USA. Typically hearty dishes served in the rustic dining rooms include lobster pie and Yankee pot roast of beef. Accommodation is available for those too stuffed to move (mains from £8: rooms from £80; wayside.org).

7Salem is a world of witch kitsch, and also home to the incredible PEABODY ESSEX MUSEUM. The vast collections include documents and artworks of local significance, plus the only complete Qing Dynasty house (below) outside China (£10; pem.org).

The SALEM INN is an easy walk away (from £90; saleminn ma.com).



Prepare for real fires, 5 Prepare for ... many floral trimmings at the BEECHWOOD INN, in the lovely Cape Cod village of Barnstable. This former sea captain's

home is shared with golden retrievers and a reputed 'mischievous' lady ghost. The breakfast prepared by innkeeper Debra Traugot often includes pancakes or freshly baked muffins, and ranks among New England's finest (rooms from £85; beechwoodinn.com).

6 Another inn with a long history, a resident ghost and no shortage of chintz, the COLONIAL INN is a social focal point of the pretty town of Concord (from £80 in the modern Prescott wing, from £100 in the main building; concordscolonialinn.com). It's a good base for strolls to the Old

> North Bridge, Walden Pond and the home of author Louisa May Alcott.



#### BARGAIN!

8 Just east of Salem awaits the relative calm of Cape Ann. Enjoy the technicolour sunsets and white sand beach at Beverly Farms before heading

to the HALE ST TAVERN, SUSHI & OYSTER BAR. Save space for the freshest oysters and the (life-changingly delicious) Hale St bbg plate, including steak, chicken, pulled pork and more (mains from £10; hale-street.com).


#### BARGAIN!

STONE'S PUBLIC HOUSE in Ashland is a small town pub with an Irish American flavour reflected in its menu, the choice of beers (Guinness and locally brewed Mayflower Golde

Ale among them), and the regular live music nights. Ask for a peek at the haunted former gambling rooms (mains from £7; stonespublic house.com).







# **EXPLORE MORE OF NEW ENGLAND**

Spooked yourself silly? Now see some of New England's more traditional highlights



## **ACADIA NATIONAL PARK**

WHY GO? Famed for its unparalleled coastal beauty, New England's only national park is set on Mount Desert Island, offering forest-covered mountains and placid lakes. Venture in and you'll unearth a feast of activities - the park has more than 20 miles of hiking paths, you can rent mountain bikes (barharborbike.com), while the more adventurous can try kayaking (acadiakayak.com), rock climbing (acadiaclimbing.com) and scenic gliding (acadiaairtours.com). Wind down with world-renowned Maine lobster or clam chowder and enjoy views over Bar Harbor.

STAY 2 Cats, in Bar Harbor, is a cosy guesthouse with a café. The three rooms have wooden floors and four-poster beds. Try its trout omelettes, muffins and cappuccinos (from £80; 2catsbarharbor.com).

#### **GETTING THERE**

Drive from Boston. Take the I-95 N and follow the ME-3 E to Bar Harbor. The journey takes about five hours.



#### MARTHA'S VINEYARD

WHY GO? A favourite with locals, day-trippers and even celebrities, New England's largest island is both charming and beautiful. It's a far cry from the commercial mainland, and that's what makes it popular with the resident artists and musicians. The island's five lighthouses are must-sees, as are the vineyards, with the added temptation of free tasting tours. If you're after sand and sun, head out to Katama Beach. Avoid the rough surf by staying on the inland side where you'll find protected salt ponds.

STAY Crocker House Inn, in the town of Vineyard Haven, is snug but elegant. Rooms are suitably beach summer fresh, in whites and pastels (from £80; crockerhouseinn.com).

GETTING THERE Cape Air flies from Boston to Martha's Vineyard Airport in the centre of the island (40 minutes; from £157 return; flycapeair.com). From the airport, public buses run to all of the island's villages and several of its beaches (60p per trip each way).



# FRANCONIA

WHY GO? Once the home of American poet Robert Frost, this tranquil New Hampshire town offers beautiful views. It's set in the vast White Mountain Region; a spectacular array of soaring peaks. Depending on the season, you can either canoe, horseback ride or mountain climb or ski, skate or snowshoe. If you're in for something less strenuous, visit Frost's farm, the Frost Place (frostplace.org). And with the picturesque towns of Bethlehem and Sugar Hill nearby, take an afternoon to explore the country roads, antique shops and farm stands. STAY Sugar Hill Inn is a restored 1789 farmhouse, which sits atop a hill lined with sugar maples (see Leaf Peeping, right). The 14 rooms are beautifully furnished and some come with Jacuzzis (from £85; sugarhillinn.com).

#### **GETTING THERE**

Drive, or Concord Coach Lines run to Mac's Market in Franconia from Boston Logan International Airport (£40 return; concordcoachlines.com).

# THE ART OF LEAF PEEPING

Autumn; the time of conkers, gloves and a farewell sigh to the summer. But over in New England, instead of mourning the loss of the sun, the natural beauty of seasonal change is embraced. Leaf peeping, a well renowned activity in the region, involves viewing and photographing the leaves as they turn from greens to crisp, fiery reds, oranges and yellows; then onwards to crunchy rusts and browns. Forget the winter blues: think blazes of awe-inspiring colour. Yankee Foliage will provide you with the wheres and whens of leaf peeping, as this varies considerably across the region (yankeefoliage. com). If you've landed in Boston, you're already spoilt for choice with the 50-acre Boston Common and the Charles River Esplanade. Further afield, head south for the seaside town of Little Compton in Connecticut: the village greens burst with colour in sharp contrast to the town's old, grand estates. If you're travelling north, the winding Kamcamagus Highway across the White Mountains boasts uncountable occurrences. Leaf-peeping season usually falls between late September and mid-October, but enthusiasts can catch the bejewelled trees earlier by travelling north, or higher in altitude
